Tip of the Month

Look to your windows for energy savings. Use weather stripping on old windows, and, if you can, add storm windows. In hot climates, add solar film screening to west-facing windows to catch heat. For new units, consider double-glazed panes; in cold climates, "low-e" coatings on glass can help reduce heat loss.

Lighten the Load of Paying Bills with Automatic Bank Draft from your Electric Cooperative



Electronic payment options like Automatic Bank-Draft can save members time and money by avoiding the use of checks, stamps, and driving expenses.

Lake Region Electric Cooperative (LREC) continues to offer its members beneficial and convenient services related to receiving and paying their monthly bills. We offer Automatic Bank-Draft four times a month for members to have their electric bill drafted from their bank account. Automatic Bank-Draft payments are transferred directly from your checking or savings account to LREC. We look forward to these draft dates helping members who receive their paycheck or income at different times. Automatic draft dates are the 1st, 5th, 12th, or 19th of each month. Members will have the option of setting the date they want their monthly bill drafted. If a member is already participating in the Automatic Bank-Draft program, you can ask to be switched to your preferred draft date.

Automatic Bank-Draft can be set-up by visiting one of our offices or calling our office to request a form. Members can also apply online at www.lrecok.coop. Members 3772300 will need to continue paying their electric bill as normal until "BANK DRAFT" is printed on the bill.

Members who sign up in the month of August for the

Automatic Bank-Draft program will be put into a drawing for one of four \$25.00 Wal-Mart gift cards.

Know How to Stay Safe in Car Accidents involving Power Lines



In traumatic situations, it may be instinctive to flee as soon as possible. A car accident is a good example of this. However, if you are in a car accident with a power line, the safest place is often inside the car.

Power poles carry high, potentially fatal levels of electricity. If you are in an accident with one, your whole vehicle may be charged with electricity. If you step out, you will become the electricity's path to the ground and could be killed by an electric shock.

The only circumstance when you should exit the vehicle is if it is on fire. If you must exit the vehicle, jump clear of it with your feet together, and continue to "bunny hop" with your feet together so that you will not have different strengths of electric current running from one foot to another.

Car accidents with downed lines are not just dangerous for those involved. Well-meaning bystanders may try to approach the car to help. Warn them to stay away from the accident until utility professionals and emergency responders have confirmed that there are no electrical dangers.

Lake Region Electric Cooperative encourages you to share what you know about electrical safety with friends, family, and new drivers. Know what to do in a car accident with a power lines.


Lake Region Pays Taxes to Benefit Local Schools

Classes have started for many area schools and students are back in the classrooms. Education is important for students and Lake Region Electric Cooperative believes strongly in supporting local school districts within its service territory.

People may believe that LREC does not pay taxes because they are a non-profit organization. LREC does indeed pay a Gross Receipts Tax on the sale of electricity. The tax is equal to 2% of the total gross receipts on the sale of electricity.

Ninety-five percent of the tax paid is distributed by the Oklahoma Tax Commission to area schools. Each school receives an amount determined by the miles of line in its district. The chart, to the right of this page, shows distributions and a breakdown of the 2011 taxes paid per school district.

In 2011, LREC paid \$737,950.19 on 3,023 miles of line to 34 school districts in its seven county territory.
