Changes to Rebate Program for 2012

Lake Region Electric Cooperative offers a variety of rebates and services through our Take Control & Save Energy Efficiency Program. These rebates come from Associated Electric Cooperative, Inc. (AECI), our energy producer, who we buy our power from. AECI has updated the criteria for certain rebates and will end some of the rebates this year.

1) The clothes washer and dishwasher rebates will end June 1, 2012. Rebates will be honored through Sept. 1, 2012 for those appliances purchased prior to June 1, 2012.

2) Increases in EER requirements on Ground Source Heat Pumps and Dual Fuel Heat Pumps to Energy Star rating plus 2 points began on Jan. 1, 2012. Rebates will be honored through April 1, 2012 for those units meeting old 2011 requirements and in-

Operation Round-Up Update



Through the Operation Round-Up program, members voluntarily "roundup" their electric bills to the nearest dol-

lar each month.

Each participant donates an average of \$6 a year, all of which goes directly toward meeting local needs.

For participating members, it is only small change, 1 cent to 99 cents per month, but when you multiply that by the thousands of generous Lake Region Electric Cooperative members who participate in Operation Round-Up, it is making a significant impact on our local communities.

These grants have provided medical care and equipment, food, clothing, housing, educational assistance and many other needed services and products. The Operation Round-Up Foundation met during their regular business meeting, held on January 25, 2012, to approve eight grants. During the January meeting, grants were awarded to:

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Stay Safe around Overhead Power Lines

It can be all too easy to overlook things that we see every day, such as overhead power lines. However, failure to notice high voltage power lines can be a deadly oversight.

Lake Region Electric Cooperative encourages everyone to look up and around you. Follow these guidelines as you prepare to work on outdoor projects this year:

Always be aware of the location of power lines, particu-

larly when using long tools like ladders, pool skimmers, and pruning poles. Be sure to lower your long equipment when you are moving it. Carry ladders and other long items horizontally whenever possible.

Be careful when working on or around your roof, installing rooftop antennas and satellite dishes, installing or cleaning gutters, or doing repair work. Never go up on the roof in windy or bad weather.

Be especially careful when working near power lines attached to your house. Keep equipment and yourself at least 10 feet from lines.

Never trim trees near power lines, leave that to the professionals. Never use water or blower extensions to clean gutters near electric lines. Contact a professional maintenance contractor.

Never climb trees near power lines. Even if the power lines are not touching the tree, they could come in contact when more weight is added to the branch.
